### Introduction

The primary objective of internal audit is to review, appraise and report upon the adequacy of internal control systems operating throughout the council. To achieve this SALC adopt a predominantly systems-based approach to audit.

The council's internal control system comprises the whole network of systems established within the council to provide reasonable assurance that the council's objectives will be achieved, with reference to:

- the effectiveness of operations
- the economic and efficient use of resources

- compliance with applicable policies, procedures, laws, and regulations
- the safeguarding of assets and interests from losses of all kinds, including those arising from fraud, irregularity, and corruption
- the integrity and reliability of information, accounts, and data

## Methodology

When conducting the audit, the internal auditor may:

- conduct a selective assessment of compliance with relevant procedures and controls expected to be in operation during the financial year in order to be able to complete the Annual Internal Audit Report 2020/21 of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR)
- review the reliability and integrity of financial information and the means used to identify, measure, classify and report such information
- review the means of safeguarding assets and, as appropriate, verify the existence of such assets
- appraise the economy and efficiency with which resources are employed, identify opportunities to improve performance and recommend solutions to problems
- review the established systems to ensure compliance with those policies, procedures, laws, and regulations which could have a significant impact on operations, and determine whether the council complies
- review the operations and activities to ascertain whether results are consistent with objectives and whether they are being conducted as planned

The internal auditor will look at the methods and processes used to manage the council’s accounts and in particular that it provides clear data for reporting and monitoring purposes. This includes checking information is accurate, kept up to date, referenced and verified.

A list of payments &amp; receipts is presented to ensure formal approval of expenditure and contained within the body of the minutes. This demonstrates good practice in that there are measures in place that help safeguard public money supported by a straight forward and clear audit trail for each payment.</i></p> <p><i>Comment: Council should ensure all invoices are signed by the relevant signatories as per Councils own Internal Controls.</i></p> <p><i>Comment: The internal auditor noted Council agreed a donation to the Church for upkeep of burial ground as per minutes of 30 September 2021, however a parish council does not have the power to donate monies to maintenance or improvement relating to affairs of the church see NALC L01-18 Financial Assistance to the Church 31 January 2018</i></p> <p><b><i>Recommend: NALC’s view is that the 1894 LGA does restrict parish councils from spending on works relating to the affairs of the Church and this includes grass cutting and churchyard maintenance however the Government’s current view on the legal issue is that there is not a need for further legislation as they believe the 1894 Act restrictions do not override the provisions in later Acts of Parliament. Whilst there is no consensus on this issue, a council that considers making a</i></b></p>	

		<b>payment in these circumstances needs to consider whether it is prudent to take a course of action that it cannot be certain is legally valid.</b>

<i>Does the precept recorded agree to the Council Tax Authority's notification?</i>	Yes	The Council received precept of £7,900 during the year under review. Evidence was provided showing a full audit trail from Precept being discussed and approved to that served on the Charging Authority to receipt of same in the Council's Bank Account.
<i>If appropriate, are CIL reporting schedules in accordance with the Regulations?<sup>7</sup></i>	Yes	CIL funds received for the year under review show total receipts of £11,479.68 as reported to full Council. The Council has complied with its duty to produce an annual report for year 2020-21 that details the amount of CIL funds received and spent. There are suitable payroll arrangements in place which ensures the accuracy and legitimacy of payments of salaries, and associated liabilities and as such the Council has complied with its duties under employment legislation.
